Pediatric Feeding and Swallowing in the Acute Rehabilitation Setting

The respiratory compromised pediatric patient seen in the acute rehabilitation setting has changed over the years; however, pediatric feeding and swallowing issues remain. Treating pediatric patients with feeding and swallowing issues requires a team based approach as one must take into consideration medical status, developmental changes, planning for future surgeries, and their family needs and expectations. This talk will address considerations, recommendations and accommodations that are made specifically for the respiratory compromised pediatric patient when targeting feeding and swallowing in the acute rehabilitation setting prior to their discharge home.

Pediatric Feeding and Swallowing in the Clinical Setting

Pediatric feeding and swallowing issues are often addressed as an outpatient in clinical settings. While some children come to us from acute care or a rehabilitation stay, we are often the first stop for assessment and treatment. This talk will address common issues seen in clinical practice of infants and children with feeding and swallowing difficulties and how best to triage, manage, and generalize improved feeding and swallowing to the home environment.
